



#### STEWARDSHIP A DISCIPLE'S RESPONSE

A Pastoral Letter on Stewardship—10th Anniversary Edition

(Part 6—this reflection will be updated every second week)

#### I. THE CALL

#### RESPONDING TO THE CALL

Jesus not only calls people to him but also forms them and sends them out in his service (cf. Mt 10:5ff.; Mk 6:7ff.; Lk 9:1ff.). Being sent on a mission is a consequence of being a disciple. Whoever wants to follow Christ will have much work to do on his behalf—announcing the Good News and serving others as Jesus did.

Jesus' call is urgent. He does not tell people to follow him at some time in the future but here and now—at this moment, in these circumstances. There can be no delay. "Go and proclaim the kingdom of God. . . . No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God" (Lk 9:60, 62).

But a person can say no to Christ. Consider the wealthy and good young man who approaches Jesus asking how to lead an even better life. Sell your goods, Jesus tells him; give to the poor, and follow me. "When the young man heard this statement, he went away sad, for he had many possessions" (Mt 19:22).

Attachment to possessions is always more or less a problem, both for individuals and for the community of faith. In The Long Loneliness (New York: Doubleday/Image Books, 1959), written years after she became a Catholic, Dorothy Day recalls the "scandal" of encountering a worldly Church — or, more properly, the worldliness of some Catholics: "businesslike priests . . . collective wealth . . . lack of sense of responsibility for the poor." She concludes: "There was plenty of charity but too little justice" (140).

"As each one of us has received a gift, used to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied grace (1Peter 4:10)."



Very early in the morning after the Sabbath, Mary Magdalene went to the tomb to anoint Jesus' body with precious oils. The reward of this *good and conscientious steward* was to be among the first to know that Jesus had been raised from the dead! **Alleluia!**

# Second Sunday of Easter Divine Mercy Sunday—Complete Pardon to Souls

Our Lord Jesus Christ is The Divine Mercy. He is full love and mercy for us. With His whole Heart, He wants to save souls. Jesus chose Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska to write down all His words to her in a diary, in which He instructs the world about His Divine Mercy (see *Diary*, 1142). Through Jesus' directives to St. Faustina, in her *Diary*, *Divine Mercy in My Soul*, our Holy Catholic Church has promoted The Divine Mercy message and devotion throughout the universal Church.

St. Faustina wrote in her diary, that Jesus said He wants the first Sunday after Easter be the Feast of Mercy (see *Diary*, 299). Therefore, when Pope John Paul II canonized Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska on April 30, 2000, he stated during his homily: "The Second Sunday of Easter from now on throughout the Church will be called 'Divine Mercy Sunday."

Divine Mercy Sunday is a very special day. If we follow the directives of our Catholic Church we can have all our sins forgiven, and our time in Purgatory cancelled. Jesus said, I want to grant a complete pardon to the souls that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion on the Feast of My Mercy (Diary, 1109, 699). On all other days of the year the Sacrament of Reconciliation forgives sins, saves us from Hell and reconciles us with God so we can receive His graces; but it does not take away our time in Purgatory. "Every sin, even venial, entails an unhealthy attachment to creatures, which must be purified either here or after death in the state Purgatory" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1472, 1473). This suffering in Purgatory cleanses the soul completely and prepares the repentant sinner to go to Heaven.

Divine Mercy Sunday is the greatest day of the year for us sinners. On this day Jesus has promised to totally forgive all sins and take away all punishment in Purgatory—"complete pardon"—for those who "go to Confession and receive Holy Communion" worthily on this special day. So all sins and punishment are removed on this day, from



when we were born up to this point in time. However, it also means that from this day on, we will have to suffer in Purgatory for any future sins, until we go to Divine Mercy Sunday to Confession and Holy Communion the following year. So every year on this special day, we are wiped completely clean.

Pope Benedict XVI stated that we can go to Confession in Lent, and during the week before Divine Mercy Sunday; because a priest cannot cope with 500 people all wanting to go to Confession on that one day. So let us fulfill the conditions set by our Church, receive Holy Communion on Divine Mercy Sunday, and take advantage of this marvelous offering.
