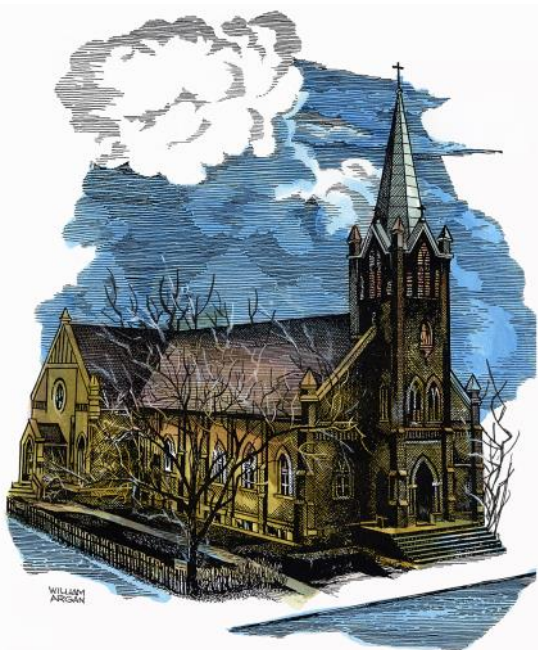

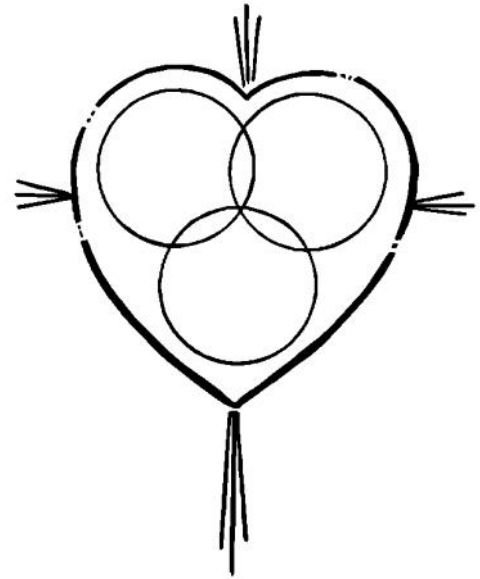

Church Floor & Bell Tower Underpinning Project: Contractors have completed excavating the ground around and down to the base of the four(4) large transept columns. This preparation work makes way for underpinning each transept column/pad with two(2) new piles. The transept columns will not be adjustable, so the underpinning process is more complicated to ensure that the floor in the transept area will be level as possible.

The floor leveling process in the 1905 part of the building is focused on the last and most dysfunctional part of the building. The southwest corner of the church suffers from extreme longstanding structural dysfunction. This is where the new children's room and washroom are located, where the stained glass window is removed, where the wall is braced and where there is structural roof/bell tower damage. The church floor in this area was heaved (lifted) by more than two(2) inches. The floor still needs to be lowered by another 3/4 inches before the flooring contractor can resume. The building is adapting; however, only small 1/4 inch adjustments can be made and then we wait for the building to heal, before making the next adjustment can be made.

Rediscover Mercy - Feed The Hungry

The works of mercy are broken up into two categories: the corporal works of mercy and the spiritual works of mercy. Sacred Scripture defines seven corporal works of mercy (Matt 25:31-46): Feed the hungry, Give drink to the thirsty, Cloth the naked, Shelter the homeless, Visit the sick, Visit the imprisoned, Bury the dead. The corporal works of mercy are concerned primarily with meeting the physical needs of others.

We live in a world where hunger is a daily reality for nearly 800 million people (World Food Programme). But how do I tangibly and prudently feed the hungry? The “one level down” concept, a practical way to not only feed the hungry, but also live out other works of mercy.

The basic concept is this: Whenever you are going to purchase something, look at what you want, then buy “one level down” from that. You can put that into practice this Advent. Make it a point to purchase one level down from what you normally buy. Order a smaller meal, go for the off-brand, rent a movie instead of going out, etc. At the end of Advent, tally up the money you saved and make sure someone in your community has a meal this Christmas.

FREE TO BE GENEROUS

This exercise clearly is about living more generously and giving to the poor, but let’s dig a little deeper. In order to do that authentically, we need to focus on detachment from the things of this world. In the midst of the complexities of this modern era, we find ourselves enslaved and imprisoned by a thousand different whims, cravings, addictions, and attachments. We cannot live out the works of mercy if we are attached to our desire for things. By separating ourselves from a love of things, we can more fully love people.

To love is to give yourself freely and without reservation. Yet, to give yourself—to another person, to an endeavor, or to God—you must first possess yourself. The person who has little self-possession thinks only of himself and constantly places his desires before the needs of others. The very act of loving is an act of self-donation, of giving ourselves to another.

All the spiritual disciplines that make up the incredible landscape of Catholic spirituality are designed in one way or another to restore our lost self-possession so that we can once again love God and neighbor, and be loved the way we were created to be loved.

Living with a one-level-down mentality is just one way that we can practice this self-possession and free ourselves to love through the works of mercy.

REFLECTION

Focus: In what way are you imprisoned by whims, cravings, addictions, or attachments?

Act: Integrate a one-level-down mentality into your purchase decisions. Start today by doing it once.

Pray: I beg of you, my Lord, to remove anything which separates me from you, and you from me.

Nepal one year after the Earthquake

Development and Peace has received new funding from Global Affairs Canada to help support those ongoing conflict-affected communities:

Ecuador: \$50,000 towards emergency relief efforts after a violent earthquake measuring 7.8 on the Richter scale struck the country on Saturday, April 16th, 2016. **Iraq:** \$3.7 million for emergency assistance, such as shelters and sanitation facilities. **Syria:** \$2.25 million to food security and supply emergency aid. **MiningWatch** and Development and Peace and sent out a press release asking the Prime Minister to give special attention to the letter on Canada's foreign policy regarding the global mining sector and to take action.
