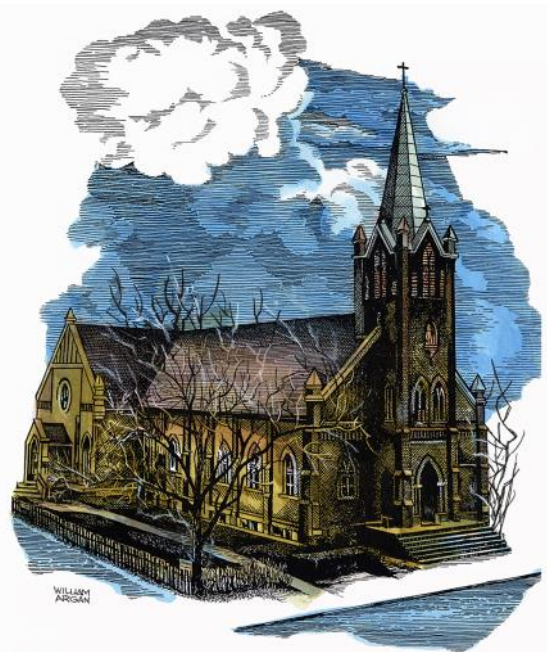

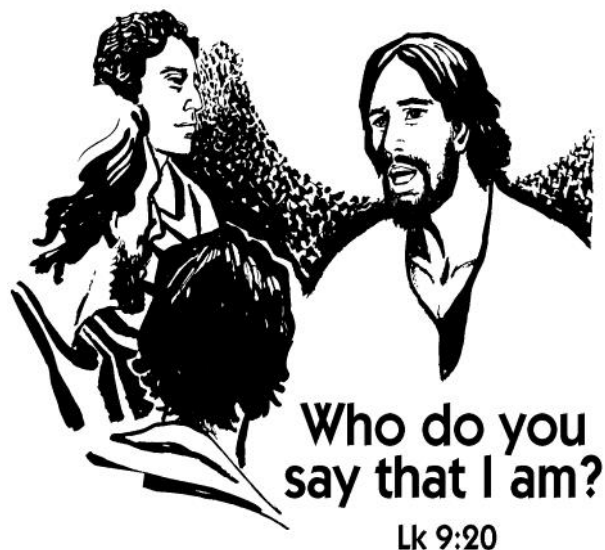

**Church Floor & Bell Tower Underpinning Project:** The general contractor has informed us that Caltec Flooring will be on site starting Monday, June 20th to resume the floor replacement project. Last fall, all of the old tiles were completely removed. However, the old red carpet was not removed because the sanctuary area is being used to temporarily store pews to make space for work in the main body of the church (i.e. nave).

Last fall, approximately 25% of the new sub-floor was installed in the church nave, as well as in the new children's room and the new washroom. We estimate that it will take about 2.5 months to complete the installation of remaining sub-floor, install new floor tiles and install the new carpet in the sanctuary area. Bear in mind that all of the pews need to be moved several times during the flooring process and then moved back into place before being refastened to the floor.

The communion rail and the confessional in the north west end of the church will be refurbished before they can be reinstalled. There are plaster cracks in the ceiling which will remain until the structural repairs to the roof are completed.

# Rediscover Mercy - Clothe The Naked

The works of mercy are broken up into two categories: the corporal works of mercy and the spiritual works of mercy. Sacred Scripture defines seven corporal works of mercy (Matt 25:31-46): Feed the hungry, Give drink to the thirsty, Cloth the naked, Shelter the homeless, Visit the sick, Visit the imprisoned, Bury the dead. The corporal works of mercy are concerned primarily with meeting the physical needs of others. One of those ways is the mission to clothe mankind with the dignity given to them by the love of God.

There is a pervasive spiritual nakedness that plagues our modern culture, which may be counterintuitive to you—if you find it challenging, if you question your own worth as a child of God, if you find it challenging to accept a love you don't deserve—then maybe it's time for you to rediscover the genius of Catholicism. While there aren't many people running around naked, there is still work to be done. Far too many individuals are suffering because they are unable to secure adequate employment, and they are left feeling like second-class humans.

## CLOTHE THE NAKED

If the Catholic Church is the greatest humanizing force on the planet then this is a reality we cannot stand for. Here are three simple ways that we can clothe the naked and show them the dignity they deserve as a child of God.

1. **Participate in a clothing drive.** The homeless and the working poor suffer from inadequate clothing to stay warm during the winter. If you live by a city, all you need to do is drive through it at night and you will see people sleeping under thin blankets and jackets barely suitable for a cool fall night, let alone the heart of winter. As a point of action, you can call your local school administration; they will tell you where the need is for children in your hometown. The need is there; do you feel called to answer it?
2. **Donate professional clothing.** In most cities there are shops that accept donations of new and used professional women's clothing. Women who are struggling to get back on their feet go there and receive clothes that they can wear on interviews or, if they get the job, clothes they can wear to work everyday. There are many qualified people who need work but cannot get past the interview process because they don't have the money to pay for adequate clothing. These individuals are not only inflicted with poverty, but also beset by feeling less human because what they wear fails to uphold their dignity as a person. There are ministries like this across the country; find one by you and help a poor soul in need.
3. **Donate your own clothes.** I would like to throw a personal twist to this often-practiced spring-cleaning activity. How often is your "donation" merely a dumping of things that you don't want anyway? While there is nothing wrong with this and it is still a charitable act, consider giving something you love. I have made it a practice to donate my favorite item of the moment as a gift to someone in need every time I clean out my closet. Do you feel called to do the same?

## REFLECTION

**Focus:** Who will you let determine your worth and the worth of others? God or the culture?

**Act:** Pick one of the three options listed above. See the people you are serving as children of God.

**Pray:** Dear Heavenly Father, my desire for you is written in my heart, because I was created by you and for you. You never cease to draw me to you. Help me to respond to your invitation with a generous yes. (Based on Catechism of the Catholic Church No. 27)
